God's Mercy and Healing Is Infinite

"Any priest will tell you that, whether in the confessional or in private discussion, women who feel the need to talk about their abortion carry tremendous pain and regret. A woman has never told me that she is proud of her abortion; on the contrary, it is one of the heaviest burdens that she carries. Hence the reason she goes to the priest: to receive God's forgiveness and healing.

Several times, as I've spoken with a woman who's had an abortion, I've thought to myself during the conversation: This woman was lied to. She didn't freely choose this. She felt pressured. She was scared. Where are the pro-abortion people now that this woman needs healing, love, and forgiveness? They're nowhere to be found, and the Church is left to pick up the broken pieces, which we will happily do.

As priests we deal with the aftermath of abortion. We see what many people who promote and defend abortion don't see: the pain, guilt and sorrow that these women carry. It's not a pretty picture. Abortion is not a glorious choice nor is it some great act of human freedom.

There is good news, however, for any woman who's had an abortion. Her regret can lead her into the loving and merciful arms of the Lord. Each time I speak with a woman who's had an abortion, particularly if it's in the context of the sacrament of reconciliation, my words are the same: no sin is greater than God's love and mercy. The Lord desires to forgive and He will forgive.

Those in the pro-abortion movement may not be there for the woman after her abortion, but the Church is. I want to encourage any woman who's had an abortion and is experiencing pain not to be afraid to turn to the Lord and to ask for His healing. He wants to embrace you. No sin is greater than the love He has for you. As a priest, it is a deeply moving experience when I am able to speak words of forgiveness to a woman who has had an abortion. Do not be afraid to turn to Him. And if you know someone who needs God's mercy and healing because she's had an abortion, encourage her to turn to the Lord. She needs to know that He is waiting to embrace her with His love."

CATECHISM CORNER

From the *Catechism of St. Pius X*



The Ninth Article of the Creed - The Pope and the Bishops

- 65 Q.** What is a Bishop in his own diocese?
A. A Bishop in his own diocese is the lawful Pastor, the Father, the Teacher, the Superior of all the faithful, ecclesiastic and lay belonging to his diocese.
- 66 Q.** Why is the Bishop called the lawful Pastor?
A. The Bishop is called the lawful Pastor because the jurisdiction, or the power which he has to govern the faithful of his diocese, is conferred upon him according to the laws and regulations of the Church.
- 67 Q.** To whom do the Pope and the Bishops succeed?
A. The Pope is the successor of St. Peter, the Prince of the Apostles; and the Bishops are the Successors of the Apostles, in all that regards the ordinary government of the Church.



The Sacrament of Baptism



To schedule a Baptism, parents and godparents are first required to attend a Baptism Preparation class. Please call the church to register for the class or register in person at the church. Baptisms will not be scheduled until parents and godparents have attended the class and all paperwork has been turned in. The paperwork includes a St. Vincent de Paul Parish registration packet (if the family is not already registered), the Baptism registration form and sponsor certificates for the godmother and godfather.

(Classes are held in English unless otherwise indicated.)

Note: While Baptism classes are still offered, Baptisms are not scheduled during Advent or Lent.

Sunday Morning Holy Mass Schedule - Effective July 1

On July 1st a new Sunday morning Holy Mass schedule will be implemented. Holy Mass on Sunday mornings will be celebrated at 9:00 a.m. only. This change will only affect Sunday mornings. Saturday and Sunday evening Holy Mass times will remain the same. We hope to offer a simple breakfast on Sunday mornings following Holy Mass, when classes are in session, and possibly every Sunday. Morning Religious Education classes will take place from 10:45 a.m. to 11:50 a.m. beginning on September 9, 2018. We hope that all current Sunday morning ministry volunteers will continue to serve at the 9:00 a.m. Holy Mass.

Sunday June 3

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ **Gospel Reading**

Mark 14: 12-16, 22-26

Jesus shares his Last Supper with his disciples.

Today, the second Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate a second solemnity, which marks our return to Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar. Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. At one time, this day was called *Corpus Christi*, the Latin words for “the Body of Christ.” In the most recent revision of our liturgical rites, the name for this day is expanded to be a more complete reflection of our Eucharistic theology.

In our reading for today, we read the account of the Last Supper found in the Gospel of Mark. It begins with the instructions that Jesus gave to his disciples to prepare their Passover celebration. It then goes on to give an account of the Last Supper. On this Sunday, however, our Lectionary reading omits the verses between these two passages; in those omitted verses we hear Jesus predict his betrayal by one of his disciples.

The Gospel of Mark describes Jesus’ Last Supper with his disciples as a celebration of the Jewish feast of Passover. The Jewish celebration of Passover is a memorial to and a ritual participation in the defining moment of Israel’s history. It celebrates God’s deliverance of his people from slavery in Egypt. The Passover meal includes many ritually important elements, such as unleavened bread, lamb, and bitter herbs. Each food item recalls an aspect of the Exodus event. The instructions for the preparation of this meal are carefully prescribed in the Law of Moses. It is a central obligation of the Jewish faith tradition to celebrate this meal and to give thanks to God for his deliverance and protection.

In the description of the Passover meal found in today’s Gospel, however, Mark omits many elements of the Jewish Passover meal. Instead he describes only those elements he believes to be most essential to the Christian Eucharist: Jesus took bread, blessed the bread, broke the bread, and shared it with his disciples. Similar words and actions follow as Jesus shares the chalice with his disciples. This bread now shared is Jesus’ own body. Those who drink from the chalice are invited to share in a new covenant which will be sealed by Jesus’ own blood. Mark’s Eucharistic theology looks forward to the Kingdom of God that Jesus inaugurates.

The Gospel for today reminds us that the Eucharist is a memorial of Christ’s sacrifice on the cross. We believe that Jesus is truly present to us in the elements of bread and wine. Each time we celebrate this sacrament, we prepare for the Kingdom of God. This celebration, as the Second Vatican Council taught us, is the source and summit of the Christian life.
