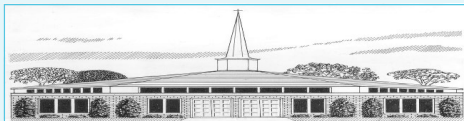

From St. Faustina's Diary

Mercy in Spirit Meditation

**Daughter, I need sacrifice lovingly accomplished,
because that alone has meaning for Me.
Enormous indeed are the debts of the world
which are due to Me; pure souls can pay them by
their sacrifice, exercising mercy in spirit**
(Diary, 1316).

My Prayer Response With St. Faustina

Jesus, teach me to lovingly make sacrifices for souls

Gospel Reading – Sunday, November 24, 2024

John 18:33b-37

*Jesus is questioned by Pilate about the charge brought
against him that he is "King of the Jews."*

This Sunday is the last Sunday of the Church's liturgical year. On this Sunday we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. Each year we set aside this Sunday to reflect upon this title that we have given to Jesus.

In John's Gospel, Pilate is shown in a more favorable light than in the other Gospels. In today's reading, we hear one of two dialogues between Jesus and Pilate that are reported in John's Gospel. Pilate questions Jesus about the charges brought against him. Caiaphas and the high priests have charged Jesus with a political crime, one that would require a punishment of death. Pilate distances himself from the Jewish leaders who accuse Jesus; he is not a Jew, and he seems to want little to do with this Jewish affair.

In his responses to Pilate's questions, Jesus distinguishes his kingdom from the political powers of this world. King and kingdom may be appropriate terms for Jesus' mission and promise, but only by analogy. Jesus is king, but not the kind of king we imagine or expect. He was certainly not the kind of king Pilate feared he might be.

Jesus refers to a kingdom that does not belong to this world. This has been mentioned earlier in John's Gospel. In today's reading, we see Jesus identify the final proof that his kingdom is not of this world: If his kingdom were of this world, then there would be people fighting to save him. Again we hear echoes of John's theme—salvation is worked out through a cosmic battle.

Truth has been another important theme in John's Gospel. We see it emphasized in the conclusion of the dialogue between Jesus and Pilate. Those who know the truth will recognize Jesus as king and will know how to interpret this insight. Yet Jesus' kingship was hidden from many of his contemporaries. Only those chosen, those who have the eyes of faith, are able to see. As modern disciples of Jesus, we also struggle at times to recognize Jesus as king. Today's Gospel invites us to see with eyes of faith that we might recognize that Jesus, through his crucifixion and death, is indeed king and Savior of all.

God's Mercy and Healing Is Infinite

"Any priest will tell you that, whether in the confessional or in private discussion, women who feel the need to talk about their abortion carry tremendous pain and regret. A woman has never told me that she is proud of her abortion; on the contrary, it is one of the heaviest burdens that she carries. Hence the reason she goes to the priest: to receive God's forgiveness and healing.

Several times, as I've spoken with a woman who's had an abortion, I've thought to myself during the conversation: This woman was lied to. She didn't freely choose this. She felt pressured. She was scared. Where are the pro-abortion people now that this woman needs healing, love, and forgiveness? They're nowhere to be found, and the Church is left to pick up the broken pieces, which we will happily do.

As priests we deal with the aftermath of abortion. We see what many people who promote and defend abortion don't see: the pain, guilt and sorrow that these women carry. It's not a pretty picture. Abortion is not a glorious choice nor is it some great act of human freedom.

There is good news, however, for any woman who's had an abortion. Her regret can lead her into the loving and merciful arms of the Lord. Each time I speak with a woman who's had an abortion, particularly if it's in the context of the sacrament of reconciliation, my words are the same: no sin is greater than God's love and mercy. The Lord desires to forgive and He will forgive.

Those in the pro-abortion movement may not be there for the woman after her abortion, but the Church is. I want to encourage any woman who's had an abortion and is experiencing pain not to be afraid to turn to the Lord and to ask for His healing. He wants to embrace you. No sin is greater than the love He has for you. As a priest, it is a deeply moving experience when I am able to speak words of forgiveness to a woman who has had an abortion. Do not be afraid to turn to Him. And if you know someone who needs God's mercy and healing because she's had an abortion, encourage her to turn to the Lord. She needs to know that He is waiting to embrace her with His love."


