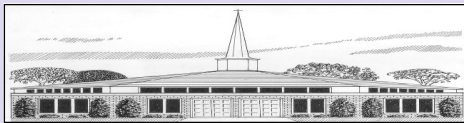

From St. Faustina's Diary *Thinking About Poor Sinners* *Meditation*

Pure love gives the soul strength at the very moment of dying. When I was dying on the cross, I was not thinking about Myself, but about poor sinners, and I prayed for them to My Father *(Diary, 324).*

My Prayer Response With St. Faustina

Jesus, may Your pure love give me strength to love and pray for sinners. Have mercy on us all. And thank You, Lord, that on the Cross, You were not thinking of Yourself but of us poor sinners.

Gospel Reading – Sunday, November 17, 2024

Mark 13:24-32

Jesus teaches about the signs of the coming of the Son of Man.

Before we consider Jesus' words, it is important to note the political backdrop against which many think Mark's Gospel was written. Most scholars concur that Mark wrote his Gospel for Christians living in or near Rome about 30 to 40 years after the death of Jesus. This was a time of political turmoil in Rome. Some Christians experienced persecution by the Romans during the reign of the emperor Nero (about 64 A.D.). Jewish revolutionaries rebelled against the Romans, which led the Romans to destroy the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 A.D. In this time of political turmoil and persecution, many in Mark's community might have wondered if the end times predicted by Jesus were in fact quite near.

Last Sunday we heard Jesus' observation about the contributions being made to the temple treasury and the example of sacrificial giving that he saw in the poor widow's offering. If we had been reading Mark's Gospel continuously, we would have heard Jesus predict the destruction of the Temple, his teaching about the costs of discipleship, and the woes that will accompany the end times. Finally, we would have heard Jesus instruct his disciples about the need for watchfulness so that they will not be caught unprepared for this final day of judgment.

In today's Gospel, Jesus continues this teaching by offering his disciples signs to look for that will indicate that the coming of the Son of Man is near. His words and images draw upon Old Testament imagery, especially images found in the Book of Daniel. Next, Jesus offers the lesson of the fig tree, a parable that teaches that if one knows how to read the signs, one can be prepared for the end times. Jesus also teaches, however, that no one knows when the end time will come, except the Father. In the verses that follow this reading in Mark's Gospel, Jesus continues to warn his disciples to be on watch for this end time.

Jesus' words are not spoken to frighten his disciples, nor should they frighten us. Rather, they are offered to prepare us for the changes we will experience during our lifetimes and at the end times. Our consolation and hope is found in the lasting nature of Jesus' words and God's never-ending love for us.

Ten Myths about Abortion (Part II)

(6) "Abortion, particularly early abortion, does not take the life of a human being"

FACT: Every abortion takes the life of a human being. This is a scientific fact, not a religious claim. Those who claim not to know "when human life begins" are making a political statement, not a scientific one. When politicians claim ignorance about who has human rights, it is not only disingenuous but also a truly frightening abandonment of responsibility. Some politicians try to portray this as an effort not to "play God," but it is actually just the opposite: the claim to be God. They may claim not to decide, but in practice, we cannot escape deciding: either every human being must be protected, or these same politicians will start deciding which other group of human beings to exclude.

(7) "Abortion is good for women"

FACT: There is simply far too much evidence showing how women suffer physically and mentally after abortion. Future pregnancies are also often harmed by preterm birth and placenta previa.

(8) "Abortion is beneficial to modern society"

FACT: The illegitimacy and child abuse rates have dramatically increased since abortion was legalized.

(9) "Access to contraception results in fewer abortions"

FACT: More contraception leads to more sexual activity, more unintended pregnancies and more abortion. Sweden and the U.K. are perfect examples, where contraception has been funded and promoted on a huge scale over the last several years. Both countries have experienced a dramatic increase in abortions, particularly among teenagers.

(10) "I am personally opposed to abortion, but pro-choice"

FACT: Beware of people (including politicians) who say this because it is impossible and pure nonsense! And they know it! How can a decision which is wrong and immoral "for them" be right for someone else? During an abortion, an innocent human being loses his or her life. Since abortion is objectively unjust, anyone who supports the "right" of others to have abortions necessarily supports unjust acts-----in this case the killing of innocent children.

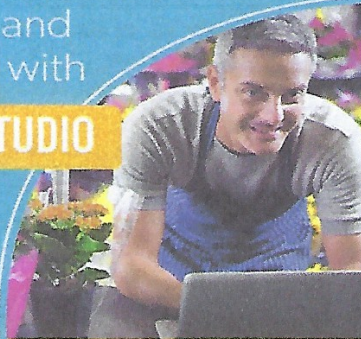

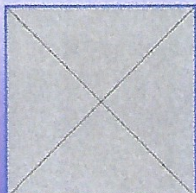
